Some of the options you might want to consider with your professional advisor include Wills, Bequests, Devise of

Property, Contingent Bequests and Residuary Bequests, Charitable Remainders, Life Insurance, Annuities and Retirement plans. By the way, you can specify that your support be used in the area of greatest need or you may apply restrictions that it be used for programs related to environmental education, land conservation (acquisition or management/restoration), outdoor recreation, or historic preservation.

Done properly, estate planning can be a Win-Win-Win situation: good for you, good for charity, and good for the environment!


